



The View from Beyond...

As someone who spent eight years as a middle school counselor in the public school system, I can say without a shadow of a doubt that these are some of the **most socially challenging years in a student's life**. It's a time of transition and change, **figuring out who you are** and who you are not, learning lessons about friends who are there one day and gone the next.

The risk was low ...

The funny thing is, I don't remember that being my experience in middle school. I went through those awkward hard years of change is a safe space surrounded by a small community who had grown up alongside of me. There were certainly challenging moments, that's unavoidable, but the risk was low. I was allowed to stumble and fall and experiment with who I really was without fear of my social standing crumbling as a result. Because at North Branch School that didn't exist, at least not in the way that I know it does in public school.

Grow into my teen years at my own pace ...

In my middle school years, I was allowed to be a middle schooler and act my age and not grow up any faster than I needed to, because I didn't have the outside pressure from peers to be someone I wasn't ready to be. I personally needed this time to still be a kid and grow into my teen years at my own pace.

And get back to learning ...

And yes, Middle school is about academics as well of course, but the social game of these three years seems to take priority with the students who are in the thick of it. I imagine learning Algebra in 7th grade is a lot easier when you don't have the weight of the world on your shoulders because "everyone in gym class hates you". A smaller and more nurturing environment that has better options for conflict resolution and restorative justice allows conflict to naturally occur where it will, sort through it appropriately, and get back to learning.

Safely growing into who I was going to be ...

Don't get me wrong, I have almost nothing but good things to say about my experience in my public high school as well, but I do believe I was ready for that at 14 in a way I never would have been at 12 entering our local middle school. I needed a few more years to safely grow into who I was going to be.

- Completion of Spanish 1



Middle school for a lot of kids can be a very challenging & unpleasant few years of intense transition, and I don't look back at my time in 6th - 8th grade that way at all. For me it was a supportive and nurturing environment.

The unique, in-depth learning experiences and the memories I made there are still so fresh in my mind, as if they happened yesterday. One parent's opinion ...

Darcy was homeschooled through 6th grade and started attending NBS for 7th and 8th grade. One of the things that I really appreciate about NBS is how they bridge the gap between the childhood years and early teen years. The middle schoolers still socialize and interact with the younger kids yet academically they are challenged. I'm impressed with how invested the middle school teachers are in bringing the best out of their students. The teachers push the students to think critically and ask questions. They are being prepared for high school level work but not in a "one size fits all" kind of way. Students are encouraged to write in their unique voices and be authentic. The result is that the kids are confident in their personal and academic abilities. The way that North Branch guides the kids to grow and learn is truly holistic.

And one more ...

Unlike many North Branch students, our daughter didn't begin her journey at North Branch until 5th grade when she transferred from public schools in Albemarle county, after a year of homeschooling due to COVID.

We were hoping to find a place for our daughter who was a differently abled learner who loved to be outside, was super curious, and had trouble sitting still and not talking.

We were hoping for kind.

What we got was so much more.

North Branch was just what she need for her middle school years. The cross-discipline approach to curriculum, a team teaching approach by extremely gifted and knowledgeable instructors, time with younger students, instruction tailored to level and ability, connection to nature, daily horse play, and so many amazing extra curricular activities, like plays, Model UN, Shakespeare, science fairs, and amazing field trips. These facets of NBS in the middle school years are just not found in the public school system. We know this to be true because our son is a middle schooler at public school now also. Other private school options may offer the same academic rigor, but our daughter is known and understood, as a human being, by her teachers and the NBS staff, in a way that is just other-level. She will leave North Branch will a certainty in her own abilities and self-worth, a set of friends that will stay with her for the next four years and beyond, and a depth and level of educational self-reliance that North Branch has instilled in her.

I know many of you are facing tough decisions about placement, timing, finances, sports, and car pools. I can only say that we understand; we're there too. We fully believe that Middle School at North Branch is the kind of quality education that will not only make our daughter successful in high school, but thrive.

I ran into Nuala's third grade public school teacher this week. We loved this teacher. She shared that she has heard only good things about NBS Middle School, and that she loved to read to evaluations sent home to parents. She marvelled about how well the NBS teachers writing the evaluations seemed to know the students. It's these relationships that sustained our daughter through the turmoil and highs and lows of middle school years. The grounding that NBS provided our daughter let her grow, warts and all, into a high schooler that she herself, and we her parents, are proud of. We'd like to thank North Branch and all the teachers for helping our daughter to find and to keep herself through these tough middle school years.
